Children:

Learn 44 sounds and matching letters

Learn to blend sounds to read words

This is decoding


Sounds

All words are made up of sounds



In English there are 44

- 1) Pure sounds
- 2) Units of s-ou-n-d



Graphemes


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A grapheme is a sound written down

English has more than 150 graphemes






Simple Speed Sounds chart





Fred helps children learn to read

Fred can only talk in sounds...

(Fred can only say *c_a_t*, he can't say **cat**)

We call this *Fred Talk*

Fred...





If children understand Fred they can *blend* orally

Blending is needed for reading

Fred...





Fred helps children learn to spell too!

Children convert words into sounds

They press the sounds on to their fingers...

We call this *Fred Fingers*



How can you help your child?



By...

using pure sounds

understanding how 'Fred' helps with reading and spelling

Sharing reading time with your child – scheme + pleasure

READING WITH YOUR CHILD Some LPS tips!

- Pleasant mood and environment
- Give time to 'work it out'
- 'Go with the Flow'
- Talk about the story
- ALWAYS be positive
- Bedtime story AT


