Sentences usually end with a **full stop**.

Question Marks



Questions often begin with words like **when, who, what, where** or **why**. Questions always finish with a **question mark**.

Exclamation Marks



You can use **exclamation marks** at the end of a sentence to show **strong emotions** such as **anger** or **surprise**: → "I never knew!"

They can also be used to show that something was said **loudly**: → "It's so noisy in here!"
